I took that advice and ran with it. I discovered that I enjoyed science and history, so my grades improved dramatically from middle school. However, about the middle of the school year, I started losing concentration on my studies and focusing on a boy. My mother's advice grew very faint again. By the end of my freshman year, I realized that all of the advice that I was receiving was in vain because I found out that I was pregnant.

My pregnancy did not stop my mother from giving me more of her knowledge and experience. She told me that this was not the end and that God was not through with me. She

said that I could get through this and still finish high school. She enrolled me in the Margaret Hudson School for mothers-to-be. I went there for a year, got restless, and decided I wanted to get my GED. Again there was more advice.

My mother next told me that I could complete my GED and that there was another person now counting on me, so I should do my best. Even though I was close to passing my GED and just needed to study the math portion more, money ruled over my education. I began to work with the mentally disabled and found my passion for helping the handicapped in the medical field. I worked at Hissom for three years until they closed and then worked for a private client for eight and a half years. When my client moved, I moved with her to a different agency. I worked with that agency for six years.

Now, it is twenty-two years and three children later, and I am finally taking my mother's advice because I am back pursuing my education. By attending a literacy class at the Tulsa Dream Center, I am continuing my studies to get my GED at last. This time I am not quitting until I have my diploma.

Advice from Experience

If you asked me for advice, I would tell you about two things to do to be happier and more successful. Keep learning and take care of your body. After 54 years of life, I know the importance of these tips for myself and for you.

Going to school or trying to get a better education is good advice. It was not possible for me when I was a young Hispanic girl. Growing up in Tampico in the state of Tamaulipas of Mexico, I only got to finish the 9th grade. Later, my husband Adam Castro and I became migrant farmers in Oklahoma and raised four children. I was too busy to even think of going to school.

Twenty years ago when I was pregnant with my youngest child, I became diabetic. It is very important for me to eat no fried foods or sweets. That is easier said than done, but that is good advice for any diabetic. I try to eat oven-baked meats, fresh fruits and smaller amounts of food. Exercise also helps the body, but I wish I could do more exercise.

About eight years ago, I wanted to learn English. I began at the Altus Adult Education ESL program at the Booker Learning Center.

Mrs. Jeffries was my teacher. Then I went to the Great Plains Literacy Council, and Jessie Reynolds became my tutor. I

learned so much English from both women. I so much enjoyed going to the 2006 State Literacy Conference in Oklahoma City. I would suggest that adult students and tutors try to go to that kind of learning.

Due to health problems, I have had trouble getting to go to school the last couple of years. My 20-year-old daughter Mariana became a Great Plains Literacy Council tutor to help me. I really like the literacy DVDs to check out and study at home. Mariana is going to Lawton to college and helps me on the weekends learn to read, write, and speak better

English. During the week, I listen and watch the DVD lessons.

There are some ideas I want to share on what is helping me to read better and making life easier. These include making time to learn, using accommodations, and letting others help you.

My uncle once said that the day you quit learning you might as well die. You should

of life's possibilities. There are so many things to try and learn. Too often people think they have plenty of time to improve or reach their goals. I am 43 years old, and I'm trying to go back to some basic reading to get it right. But, it will take time, and I'm willing to make the effort and try new ways. Take time to try new methods or materials as they might help.

I have been screened using the PowerPath tests. They showed me the need of being able to use more concentration with fewer distractions. I have visual stress syndrome, and that has caused me trouble in progressing. I recommend using the aids or suggestions such as the colored overlays, special tinted glasses, stress relief balls, and avoiding bright lights. These are just some of the accommodations that will help me work on improving and coping with the letters. Have your eyes checked to know if you are seeing the words correctly.

Ask for help. People have helped me during my life, and I do appreciate them. First, I thank my supportive family like my mom Lavon, my stepfather Wayne Braun, and my dad Stacy. My past public school teachers such as Mrs. Walker at Mayes, Kansas, and Mrs. Kay at Granite, Oklahoma, were willing to help me. Literacy tutors in Texas and Oklahoma are wonderful volunteers who have helped me. Learn to rely on others for help. Don't dwell on the bad or your weaknesses, but look at your strengths.

These are some of my ideas that make life better. Keep on making reading part of it. Make time to improve, use reading accommodations, and get some literacy help from tutors and teachers.

Choices, Possibilities, and Advice

It was only a few years back when I decided to make my own choices concerning my 401(K) retirement account. Without any formal education on economics, very little experience trading stocks, and finding myself being emotionally involved with the fluctuations of the stock market, I had become vulnerable to what is often called "risky business."

To be a true stock broker, one is required by law to be certified with a formal education and years of studying the fundamentals of how world events affect economics. You need a specialized educational background in statistics, stock backgrounds, international politics, and asset management.

My own experience as a day trader was exciting, profitable most of the time, but it was gambling. It gave me a false sense of success. I believed I had a lucky touch at picking stocks before they began to move. Manipulation of volume is illegal because it can and did cause traders like me to follow a false lead and lose a lot of money. When considering making any stock trade, be sure to do your homework.

It is very easy to become emotional when trading your own stocks without any outside advice from a broker, who I would have to pay a premium for information that I thought I

already was aware of. I have countless stories of runs of success and falls of failure.

Many people tried to give me advice to not put myself in a position of managing my own portfolio of my life's savings. The results of my ignoring advice left me in an embarrassing position of being broke and owing the IRS. If I had to do it all over again, I would hire a well seasoned high profile professional stock brokerage firm to manage my money. My criteria would require lots of education, experience, and a broker who would not become emotionally involved with what goes on down on Wall Street.

Three Pieces of Advice

Throughout my life my mother has always been involved with all six of her children. She

never gave up on any of us, and still today, she helps me with reading and understanding documents. I also value three pieces of advice that she gave me as I was growing up. She told me to stay in school, wait to have children, and stay out of trouble. I wish I had listened to the advice she gave me then, but I learned the hard way instead.

Even though my mother told me to stay in school, I dropped out in the ninth grade because I got pregnant with my daughter. I think this was due in part to molestation during my preteen years. After two years of worrying about constant sexual abuse, I could not focus on my education because my mind was concentrating on what was going on at home. No young girl should have to go through this type of situation. When a person you trust betrays you, it turns your world upside down and makes you violent, angry, and promiscu-

ous. I stopped paying attention and doing work in my classes, so I was put in LD classes, but I was already too far behind. I did not learn anything, and the teachers just passed me right on to the next grade anyway. It was not until I had four children that I was able to return to school by attending the TANF literacy class. I now have five children and am working toward my GED. With the knowledge I have gained in class, I can now help my own children with their school work, since they are having some of the same learning difficulties that I experienced.

When I quit school, I did not have a job and was still living with my mother. Six months after I had my first child, I wanted to live on my own because I did not want to abide by her rules, such as her curfew time. I thought I was grown because I was a mother, but I was only sixteen and still immature. My older sister and

I got an apartment with my mother's consent, but when my sister had her baby and moved out, I ended up getting back with my ex-boyfriend, who supported us with drug money. When he went to prison for the second time, I could not make ends meet, so I stole whatever I needed to survive. When I got caught stealing baby supplies at Wal-Mart, I spent two weeks in a juvenile detention center and was sentenced to do 80 hours of community service. I still did not wait to have more children, and I did not use the best judgment in choosing my boyfriends, so I have had the main responsibility for their support and upbringing. If I had followed my mother's advice, I would have graduated first and then planned to have a child when I had a job and could afford the living expenses.

In addition to waiting to have children, I should have listened to my mother's third

piece of advice, which was to stay out of trouble. She warned me that grand larceny would be a felony. My shoplifting was petit larceny and a misdemeanor, and even after my punishment, I continued my criminal ways until I started the TANF class. It helped me provide for my children money-wise and also helped me learn what I had missed out on in school. When I was in school, I would fight and skip class because of the bullies who ridiculed the LD students. I even wanted to be suspended so I could avoid the other students seeing me in those classes.

Today, I am grateful to my mother for the advice she gave me as I was growing up, and the advice she gives me now about raising my children. I use her wisdom to advise my own children to stay in school and keep out of trouble. When they get older, I will also en-

courage them to wait to have their own kids and complete their education.

You can't just work with your tutor for one day a week or however many days you see them. You have to work on your reading every day. That's the only way you will get better. It may take another person to help you besides your tutor for the times when you are at home, but a lot of it you need to do yourself. Challenge yourself. Go to the library and pick up some books. Start out with something easy and then keep challenging yourself by getting books that are a little harder. Don't give up

because it seems too hard, because it is going to be hard, but eventually it will start getting a little easier.

I want to be able to help my son with his work when he gets older, so my goal is to be able to read and spell well by the time he starts school. I help myself by trying to read to him every day. Just remember to always keep your head up. If you are always looking at the ground you are going to feel low, and when you feel low you will never accomplish anything. If your head is held high you can do anything. Always remember, even though you have problems and feel down sometimes, there is always someone who has it worse than you, and things could be a lot worse for you. So just have faith and don't ever give up, and your dreams can come true.

Also, I purchased my first house for \$80,000. I ended up selling after 2 years in 1994. At this time in my life, I'm just spending money and living life.

In 1998, I had my experience with using drugs.

I moved from state to state. I always dreamed of going back to school,

so I enrolled at Rose State



College. My father had paid (before and after) my tuition. I ended up dropping out because, at the time, I was taking pills. My father was sick with cancer, and I'm his only child. Of course, I was spoiled. I could do no wrong in his eyesight. At the time, I had moved to "Vegas" for a year, until my sister told me that my dad had fallen twice, so I came back home. Eventually, he passed away on Easter Sunday, 2000.

I felt at that time I had nothing to live for, and then I moved to Dallas, TX, still using drugs. I ended up getting two drug charges, and getting two years in Texas Department of Corrections.

I came back home to Oklahoma City on my release. In February 2003, I began working at Wal-Mart for about 3 years. Then, I had the option of relapse, another choice to live or die. In 2005, I ended up pregnant with my only child, Reagan R. Berryhill. I was still getting high and drinking, neglecting me and my baby.

Eventually, the Department of Human Services (DHS) got involved. My sister ended up taking temporary custody of Reagan. I had to sit down and get it together. I had to start loving myself, so that I could love my child. It still took a couple of years to do that, but I did it after a lot of soul searching. I was able to get custody of my baby girl, and today, I'm enrolled in the Adult Basic Education classes in order to get my GED.

I have always been told that it's never too late to learn, and I'm determined to do what I have to do to earn my GED Diploma. I was told that OIC was a good program for Adult Basic Education. I've made a decision to give it a try. Today, I'm loving my classes and I am learning everything I need to learn to accomplish my goal so I can make a difference in people's lives.



Escape to the Unknown

Before the war, life was simple. I could think about the livelihood of our family. However, most people were deprived of their simplest rights, and many things were forbidden. The Iraqi was dreaming and wishing that the future was more beautiful and that he could live and enjoy his country's wealth; nevertheless, he was experiencing quietness and safety and lived in love. The Iraqi was not thinking if his neighbor was Sunni or Shiite or Christian. After the war, all that changed. The ideologies mixed together into a cauldron of hate where killing and destruction became dominant. The

displacement and the fear threatened the life of these simple people. Death began pursuing us everywhere at anytime.

The love changed to hatred, and we began knowing fear, and we could see it in all of the eyes of our neighbors. Soon after, we lived through months of the sectarian fighting that began pursuing us everywhere, whether we were in our house or on our way to work or to shop. Even our children's schools turned to battlefields. Wherever we went, we saw the destruction and the ruin in front of our eyes. Chaos and fear were everywhere, and everything that was nice, quiet, and beautiful collapsed in my beautiful country. We were forced to choose between escape from the homeland, going to the unknown, leaving our family, friends, and work that we loved; or remaining in the country and waiting for death

or being kidnapped. Both decisions were very bitter.

These bad and highly risky circumstances obligated my two children and me to escape to Syria. The road between Baghdad and Syria was about 700 kilometers, and it was very dangerous because it was occupied by the terrorists of al-Qaida. After a long and dangerous 20 hour trip through the desert, we expected the terrorists to stop us and kill us, or kidnap us, at any minute throughout the entire car ride. After that horrible trip, we arrived in Syria. However, our suffering did not end; it just began in a new way. Things like establishing residency and having to find a place to live were very difficult. I had to get my kids registered for school while I was alone. Then I had to deal with the financial pressure of providing for a family in a strange country with little resources. The worst part was the

waiting. I thought when I left Bagdad that I would be in Syria for three months at the most. Those three months turned into three years before I was able to get a visa to join my husband in America.

Here in America, we started a new life; I hope that it will be a life full of happiness. We found the safety and the stability that we lost in Baghdad, and we found friends who helped me to surpass my ordeal. They have helped me to be successful in my new life as I always was in my country. I pray to God for my country to return to a stable and safe place to live, and for the people to return to love. I thank God a lot in my present with my lovely friends here.

My parents were poor and we farmed as share croppers in Arkansas. Kids just helped with the crops and didn't go to school. I went to school some. My clothes weren't sufficient, and the children made fun because we didn't have socks. I felt bad because the children

made fun of me. I didn't want to go back, but I did finish the first grade. I remember one time my sister from Oklahoma sent me some dresses, and the kids at school kept pestering me to tell them where I got them. I wouldn't tell them where I got my clothes. My teacher then asked me where I got the clothes. So then, I told her. I felt like she shouldn't have done that. I always felt just a little bit beneath other people.

I have had a lot of trouble in my adult life with depression so severe that I attempted suicide two times. My kids have had problems with depression, drugs, and alcohol. I go to church now and I sing in a quartet. In past years, I wouldn't go to church because I didn't want to hear about God because I was afraid of God. I have asked God for forgiveness and he did, but it was hard to forgive myself. I still have problems reading the Bible, but I believe the preacher.

I chose to call the Literacy Link because I had a tutor in Ardmore before I moved to

Midwest City. I talked to Mr. John and told him what I wanted to do. He asked me, "How far do you want to go?" I told him that I would like to go to the twelfth grade if I can get there. About a month later, he had me a tutor; A very nice one, and we "knit" together.

I am reading better and I have learned a lot. I am going to keep up the good work until I feel secure in reading.

People, if you are out there hurting, I would suggest you get professional help. If you can't read like me, don't feel bad. Get help in reading. The more schooling you have, the better off you will be. If you are young, old, or middle age you can learn. Don't be one of those people who thinks you can't learn, because you can. There is a lot in this world for you, just for the taking. You'll be happier when you learn all this. I love you people, and hope you

don't go as far as I did in the wrong direction before reaching out for help. Love you all!

When I was nine years old, I was raped. I thought it was all my fault. So every time that I got scared, I ran. I ran away from school, jobs, and relationships. The only thing that I didn't run away from was being a mother.

When I was fifteen years old, I had my first child. I had a choice to stay in school or drop out. Because my main focus was to raise my daughter, I dropped out. I didn't know anything about being a mother except to change diapers and feed and clothe her. I wanted to make sure I did a good job as a mom.

I had a learning disability, so it made school hard. Dropping out was easy for me to do. When I turned sixteen, I got my first job in fast food; not the job that I really wanted, which was truck driving. Working at Burger King or McDonald's or Wendy's were all boring jobs. None of them paid well. So, I made another choice about how to support myself.

I started selling drugs. I didn't need an education for that. All I needed to know was how to add and subtract. I was good at that and nobody knew I didn't know how to read.

I didn't like the way my life was going, so I married the first man who asked me. Now, I was 20 years old, married, and still unhappy. Unfortunately, I continued selling drugs.

I knew I had another choice to make. I left my husband, and I stopped selling drugs. I tried to go back to school and be someone who I would be able to love. At the first school, I didn't feel it. It was so hard to go back to school as an adult who didn't know how to read or spell. This upset me more.

One day, I was given another choice of where to get an education. I could go to OIC. That is when my life started changing for the better. It seemed I had everything I needed to succeed. By now, I was 28 years old and was about to have my second child.

At first, I was afraid going to OIC would be another disappointment. But, I was determined to get my GED, so I made up my mind to tell people that I had a learning disability. When I made that choice, my case worker put me in OIC, which is the best program of my life.

Let me tell you about two of my teachers.

Ms. Shannon Carter is a teacher who will not

give up on me or on any of us. With her, I do not feel dumb. Ms. Marion is the same way. She pushes me to try and believes I can learn. Though she and Ms. Shannon teach very differently, they have both helped me believe in myself. These days, I wonder if I ever had a learning disability. I am learning so much, not only about reading and writing, but also math. School is making a big difference in what I believe I can do with my life.

Finishing the program at OIC has not been easy. I have dropped out and sometimes disappeared. The first time I only went to school a month. The teachers and students made me feel welcome, but family problems were still my focus at that time.

I wanted to feel better about myself, so I came back six months later and was on a roll. It didn't last long. I was about to deliver my second child. I dropped out again. One day I was sitting at home and I realized I didn't want to raise my son like I did my daughter. I would get the education I needed. This time, I was determined. I was not going to keep repeating the same mistakes over and over again. I would get my GED.

Then, a month after I came back, everything changed. Last Christmas Eve, when I was shopping, turned out to be the worst day of my life, because of another choice I made. As I was exiting the store, someone else was going out with me. As she did, the alarms went off. I got very frightened.

I didn't know what was going on.

Unfortunately, I chose to run. All I thought about was getting away. As I was running, someone grabbed me around the waist from behind. It was just like the time I was raped when I was nine years old.

This time, I was determined to fight back. I wasn't going to be treated like this again. I was still trying to deal with the first rape. I fought so hard. I kept struggling until they put me in handcuffs. Things got worse after that; however, when the winter break was over, I came back to school at OIC.

I am still here. I am determined to do whatever it takes to have a life that works. Every day I have gone to school here, I have a little more hope. Ms. Shannon makes me work hard and she doesn't give up. She is very patient with me.

Our counselor, Ms. Betty, listens to me and gives me great advice. She has helped me figure out what to do with personal problems. I know I am not alone now. I have a lot of people who care about me at OIC and can help me. I know my life is different now, because I am different. No matter what happens, I am

determined to have the life I want. OIC has showed me how to get it.

Now, I have read books about Junkyard Dan (Dried Blood, Money for Nothing, Gun in the Back, Stuffed Animal, and others) as well as a book about Abraham Lincoln. Since I have started to read, I can go to the gas station and buy gas without guessing. I can help my daughter in the fourth grade with her homework. I can read street signs.

When I go out of my journey of illiteracy, I would like to help other people who are having this kind of a problem. I am proud of myself. you've got to want to learn. It's never too late, and you're never too old to learn new things.



I was able to attend Opportunities
Industrialization Center (OIC), where I am
proceeding with my education to get my GED.
From the time I started until now, one thing
or another has come my way and has tried to
hinder me getting my education. For example,
shortly after coming to the program, I found
out things about myself that were barriers to
my education. I need glasses, I have a learning
disability, I need group work and individual
instruction to understand subjects, and I have
Visual Stress Syndrome. Because of my needs

and style of learning, I had to advocate for myself to get my needs met. This was a long, stressful, and frustrating process. However, I am doing well and my needs are being met. Later, transportation was an issue and I had to start taking the Metro transit. Because of this, I had to learn how to read the bus schedule. I also had to catch one bus after another just to get me where I needed to go. I ended up having to take 6 busses per day to get back and forth to my child's day care, to school, and to home. I had to get used to spending around three to four hours a day just for transportation.

Then, if this was not enough, I had a medical set-back. I was having back issues and found out I had two bulging discs. After months and months of pain, I was placed on half days per doctor's orders. Later, I had surgery and was out for weeks. It was difficult to come back

after surgery, but I made the choice to stick it out. Sitting all day and walking up and down stairs has been very painful, and sometimes my legs feel heavy while walking. Some days I feel I just want to be home, but I push myself to come. Now, I am balancing physical therapy twice a week. But I can say that I am not giving up! I am still holding on! There is such desire and determination in me that I thank God for renewing my strength daily. God has been with me through it all.

I am grateful for a second chance to come back to school. Now, I am able to learn and help my younger child with homework, and one day she will also finish school as well. My youngest wants to see me finish school. That makes her very happy to know that we have something to look forward to every day. Coming back to school has helped both of us stay focused and bonds us closer together.

I now realize that I am a strong person who can and will succeed. My obstacles have taught me patience. I have grown stronger because of them. Although sometimes it is a struggle, I enjoy coming to school now. I am learning a lot. I have met nice people and I get to work in groups with them. I also get to work with several tutors throughout the week. I find it very exciting when other students and I are able to interact and learn with each other. It is a support group that encourages me.




I believe that I have the possibilities to work very hard to help me accomplish my goals.

The Possibilities of Space Travel
