
Nuts!, a tale of three adventurous chipmunks who live at the zoo. Sauer read her story during performances at the Aquaticus Arena. As part of the

Visual Stress Syndrome Webinar

Adult learners, program directors, and literacy staff from throughout the state participated in a Visual

Stress Syndrome webinar presented by Dr. Laura Weisel. According to Weisel, fifty percent of adult learners have vision function challenges, and nearly ninety percent have symptoms related to Visual Stress Syndrome (VSS). Learners with VSS often report headaches, distractibility, loss of comprehension, and sensitivity to black


