Bureau of Justice Statistics

The Office of Violence Against Women in BJS states that 3.4 million people in our nation identified themselves as the victims of stalkers during 2005-2006. Half of them had experienced one unwanted contact per week from their offender, and 11% of them had been stalked for five years or longer. Included in this report is cyberstalking, which afflicts 1 in every 4 of these victims. Census Bureau

On August 3rd the Census Bureau published 2006 estimates of health insurance for all the counties in our nation. Data is also available for all the states in one file, for all the counties of our nation in one file, as maps, and as downloads. Variables: there are 5 age groups; "uninsured" and "insured"; race data for white, black, and the Hispanic of any race. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

The CDC publishes a weekly map on the rate of H1N1 infections and deaths by nation (they no longer publish this data by state). On our date of publication this figure was 5,514 infected and 353 dead. Note that this number of infections is that known by the health community; the actual number of unreported and/or unidentified infections is probably higher.
